Bibleinfo.com Partners with Discover Bible Schools

Bibleinfo.com, the Adventist scripture resource ministry, announced it will partner with Discover Bible Schools, a ministry of The Voice of Prophecy and the Seventh-day Adventist Church in North America, to expand its global outreach. This announcement marks a move for the online ministry from the Adventist's regional offices in Spokane, Washington, to the North American headquarters in Silver Spring, Maryland.

Kurt Johnson, Discover Bible Schools' director and the new director for Bibleinfo.com, says, "Bibleinfo.com and Discover Bible Schools introduce people to Scripture as the answer to life's questions. Each ministry has a unique approach, and when combined together, creates a powerful avenue for sharing one's faith. I am grateful and excited for this team approach to ministry."

Bibleinfo.com, with more than 2.6 million pages viewed last year, receives more Internet traffic than any other website owned and operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church. The success of Bibleinfo.com stems from its interactive nature. Visitors are encouraged to ask Bible questions or submit prayer requests. Each receives a personal response from one of more than 150 qualified volunteers serving around the world. The ministry responded to more than 37,000 such requests last year.

More Minute Motivators for Leaders

CREATIVITY – Leaders think creatively. Leaders don't just think outside the box. They live outside the box! If there is a conventional way to approach a problem, a great leader will think of that last. What's new? What's different? What hasn't been done? These are the questions a leader asks.

Leaders are creative people. They see things that don't exist and bring them to life. They are content to work in fresh soil. They don't need the tried and tested. They are willing to go where no one else has gone before. They are moon walkers. Leaders look at life through the binoculars of possibility. "Imagination is the beginning of creativity." – George Bernard Shaw

INVOLVEMENT – Leaders always involve others. There's a reason why Mrs. Thornapple gives every second grader a part in the Christmas play. She knows that all the parents—and most of the grandparents—will come to watch their child perform. Involvement breeds greater success.

The best leaders aren't interested in taking credit, so they don't hoard responsibility. They're interested in reaching the goal, so they involve as many people as they can. They know shared responsibility involves learning and growing experiences for their associates. A constant huddle does not make a championship team. Practice and playing time are where the experience is gained. Perfection is formed on the court or on the field. It doesn't happen in the stands or on the bench. Real leaders create an open system for involvement. "Good leadership is motivating and mobilizing others to accomplish a task or to think in ways that are for the benefit of all concerned." – Don Page

ACTION – Leaders put actions to their ideas. In the world of the five-second sound byte, ideas must be able to leap off the page and accomplish something. Leaders who can think may be good analysts, but they will never be effective until they learn to enact their ideas. Action moves theory from the niceties of the page to the needs of the people.

"He talks a good game" is a death knell when applied to a leader. Theories and principles must be tried on the playing field, and leaders are anxious to put them into play. Their actions spring from the wisdom of their maturity. They act carefully. Effective leaders understand the importance of timing. They act prudently. Their actions are based on their knowledge of available resources. They refuse to commit their team to a cause that has no obvious means of support. They act courageously. Effective leaders are not afraid to wield the machete in the jungle. They are willing to carve out new paths, to go where no one else has dared to go. A leader's actions speak louder than words. "Fear of ideas makes us impotent and ineffective." – William O. Douglas

DECISIVENESS – Leaders are decision makers. Leaders never flinch when confronted with a choice. It's their job to make decisions, and they're good at it. They know that hesitancy is a dangerous malady that infects and eventually ruins organizations. They make calculated decisions. Theirs is an educated determination based on their experience and the wisdom of others. Leaders don't procrastinate. When it's time to decide, they pay their money and get on the ride. "Efficiency is doing things right. Effectiveness is doing the right thing."- Alan Nelson

PERSONAL MINISTRIES - SABBATH SCHOOL'S PARTNER IN MINISTRY

Through the Year (2010) in Your Plan

JANUARY

Plan a "Commitment Sabbath" and ask every church member to renew their commitment to witness during the coming year. Pass out a questionnaire to find out what kind of outreach activity each person is interested in this year.

FEBRUARY

Late winter is an excellent time to launch a Revelation Seminar or start small group Bible studies. Because February is "Heart Month" in the U.S., it is also prime time for a health outreach even designed to help people prevent heart disease.

MARCH

Early spring is a good time to get started with visitation teams. You may want to start contacting the names you have of individuals who have requested information through media ministries, or Bible studies in the past. Or, launch a Reclaiming Ministry.

APRIL

The vast majority of people in North America will turn their minds toward religion at the time when Easter is celebrated by many denominations. Perhaps your local church will want to plan something to impress the minds of people in your community to think about the resurrected and soon returning of Christ.

MAY

This is the month that Seventh-day Adventists feature their ministries of compassion. The Annual Disaster and Famine Relief Offering is taken, and a Sabbath is devoted to a report from the local Adventist Community Services Center, disaster response team or inner city project.

JUNE

Summer is a good time for child evangelism. This might take the form of a traditional Vacation Bible School, Neighborhood Bible Club once a week, day camp, sponsoring underprivileged children to a Good Neighbor Camp, or a family camp weekend with parents involved with their children.

JULY

Many African-American Adventists have found the summer to be a major season for public evangelism. Bermuda, Canada and the U.S. all have their national day celebrations near the end of June or in early July. This may provide an opportunity for your church to gain visibility in the community through a float in a parade, a concert in the park, or by your Pathfinder Club acting as an honor guard for the flag.

AUGUST

There are a number of families that move at some time during the summer. These families start thinking about where to place their children for the school year and some start looking for a church. Organize visitation teams designed to contact these newcomers, some of them will visit your church.

SEPTEMBER

This is often a good month to offer a parenting seminar as a public service in the community.

OCTOBER

The fall is another good season to launch a Revelation Seminar or start small group Bible studies. Start early before the rush of the holidays.

NOVEMBER

ADRA Annual Appeal is one campaign each year when the Seventh-day Adventist Church mobilizes everyone to carry a report of our humanitarian work to each home in the community, business and civic leader.

DECEMBER

More unchurched, secular people think about Christianity during the time when Christmas is celebrated than at any other time of the year. This presents a major witnessing opportunity for your local church.

"INMATE SPIRITUAL COUNSELING" CURRICULUM SEGMENTS

"Inmate Spiritual Counseling" with an emphasis on Volunteer Prison Chaplaincy, is the new training curriculum for those who are very serious about updating their Prison Ministry skills. The 46-hour course is offered by the North American Division Academy of Continuing Education, and will be conducted in association with the International Institute of Christian Ministry of the General Conference Sabbath School/Personal Ministries Department, which has a direct relationship with Griggs University. Continuing Education Credit is a possibility for college credit in the future.

Curriculum Segment Highlights: Prison Subcultures SOC.110

The day-to-day experiences of inmates are not only affected by the official, formal organization of prisons; an informal organization among inmates—known to criminologists as the inmate subculture—is equally influential. The inmate subculture is comprised of a peculiar language and a distinctive set of informal norms, attitudes, beliefs, values, statutes, and roles that give prisoners a different perspective from people on the outside (or as prisoners say, those of us in the freeworld).

Prisons-Prisoners-Inmate-Subcultures (Internet)

Description

This module explores the peculiarities, and diversifications of inmate life behind prison walls. It acquaints the student with the intricate make-up and activities of the characteristics of Prison Subcultures.

Overview

Every prison has its own personality and subculture. Prison subcultures may differ in degrees from one prison to another, but the underlining prevalence of activities and make-up will have a common denominator. Subcultures, being a city within a city, exhibit the same sociological antisocial vices as any other cultural clusters worldwide.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. The student will gain a fundamental knowledge of the intricacies of inmate behavior behind prison walls.
- 2. The student will understand the anatomy of a prison subculture.
- 3. The student will be able to make the analogy of sub cultural activities and vices behind prison walls to that of mainstreaming culture.
- 4. The student will understand the psychological and sociological effects of subcultures on prison inmates.

Prison Fellowship's Angel Tree®

Prison Fellowship's Angel Tree® provides children of inmates with support that begins with a Christmas gift and continues all year long.

Landsdowne, Va., April 24, 2008 – Childhood has been

hard on Angel Garcia. By the age of 11, Angel's father had died of a drug overdose, her mother was serving her third stint in prison, and Angel was responding with anger and isolation-locking herself in her room at night and getting into trouble at school during the day.

But Angel's life took on a dramatic change when Prison Fellowship volunteer Tracie Groves arranged for her to attend Calicinto Ranch, a week-long camp in San Jacinto, Texas, designed specifically for kids involved in Prison Fellowship's Angel Tree program. Calicinto Ranch opened up a new world of experiences for Angel with programs and counseling that helped her cope with bitterness and anger. When she returned home from camp, Angel put what she learned into action.

"I called my mom and told her that I wanted to forgive her just like I want to be forgiven," said Angel. That act of forgiveness, spurred by Angel's camping experience was her family's first step in the healing process. Angel is now 12 years old, her mother is out of prison and back at home where she chooses to spend her time with her family-instead of on the streets. "When Angel called and said she forgave me, it was such a blessing," said Theresa, Angel's mom. "It was like a real big load was taken off my back."

Prisoners' children are five to seven times more likely to end up in prison themselves (U.S. News & World Report, April 2002). Angel Tree works with the most at-risk children and youth in America to break the intergenerational cycle of crime.
