## IT'S ALL ABOUT SABBATH SCHOOL

## A Transformational Sabbath School Class for Youth

## **Selecting Instructional Goals**

This aspect of good education is often elusive to the volunteer teacher at Sabbath School. Actual printed curricula tend to include some explicit goals, but not many of the teachers who use the curricula truly understand them, even if they are good ones. With non-formal education, teachers don't have to be concerned about such things as statement requirements, but they are attempting to teach for transformation and "a vague Sabbath School lesson aim will usually result in vague teaching." Sue Kline outlines succinct steps that will help a Sabbath School teacher connect with the idea of having instructional goals:

- "Don't necessarily adopt the lesson aim stated in your curriculum. . . .
  Consider the needs of your class, then adapt the aim and lesson to
  them."
- "Let the Scripture passage begin working in your life before you teach it to others." [This, of course, is including the concept of teacher as curriculum as mentioned earlier, the very heart of teaching for transformation and discipleship.]
- "Don't be afraid to deviate. And don't try to teach too much."
- "Knowledge becomes learning when it is translated into a life-changing action. This is more likely to happen when you begin a Bible study with a well thought-out, specific aim for your class members' spiritual growth."
- "Let the teachers enter, heart and soul, into the subject matter. Let them
  lay plans to make a practical application of the lesson, and awaken an
  interest in the minds and hearts of the children. . . . The teachers may
  give character to the work, so that the exercises will not be dry and
  uninteresting."

## Creating an Environment of Respect and Rapport

"Teaching is a matter of relationships among individuals. These relationships should be grounded in rapport and mutual respect, both between a teacher and students and among students."

For those who are teaching for spiritual transformation in youth, the very essence of what they are trying to teach is epitomized by the biblical concept of "one-anothering." The very way to tell whether or not transformation is taking place is whether or not the students are coming to experience respect for one another and class rapport. After all, Jesus said that the way it would be obvious that we were His disciples would be if we loved one another (John 13:35). This could even be a possible form of assessment of learning.

## **Establishing A Culture for Learning**

This is much needed for serious church-based Bible learning—and somewhat controversial. In many churches youth ministry and Sabbath School are not connected, and Sabbath School loses membership because it is boring. In other churches the two are connected, but Sabbath School has been made to appeal to a very broad audience and features entertainment more than learning. Whether in Sabbath School or in a smaller Bible study setting for serious learners, some venue must be established within the church program for interesting, innovative, and transforming Bible learning.

The church name and address are also on the card. Recently one person wrote a note to the church recalling that when she received the bag of quarters she was faced with a decision to finish washing her clothes or buy some gas. The gift of quarters allowed her to do both.

Class members hope that through these contacts in the community, more opportunities will come to share the love of Jesus with them.

# Q & A

# How about Special Days? Any suggestions?

Special Days are important outreach tools, and planning for them should be an integral part of the Sabbath School's annual program. Follow-up plans are a vital aspect of these Special Days and should be included in the planning process.

Plan short, enthusiastic, spiritual programs. Remember that Special Days are designed to capture interest and help create a desire to attend further services of the Sabbath School and church. Let's look at some planning principles common to organizing Special Days.

## **General Planning**

The Sabbath School Committee should plan the program several weeks in advance, including the following items:

- 1. Advertise the special day.
- 2. Ask all members to invite relatives, friends and neighbors, those who have been contacted through the Vacation Bible School, and especially non-attending church members. The membership coordinator or Sabbath School secretary should be able to provide names of non-attending persons.
- 3. Send written invitations to all former church members in the community.
- 4. Appoint a telephone committee to follow-up the written and personal invitations with telephone calls.
- 5. Display a poster in the foyer of the church.
- 6. Include announcements in the church bulletin about the special day.
- 7. Appoint a welcoming and ushering committee or enlarge the existing one.
- 8. Place a special basket or bouquet of flowers on the platform.
- 9. Select carefully those who participate in the program. Choose persons who can read and speak distinctly and can hold the interest of the audience. Those who participate should represent church standards in dress and deportment.

## Organizing The Program

- 1. Stay on time during each feature of the program.
- 2. The person offering the opening prayer should remember to ask for a blessing on friends and guests. People appreciate being remembered in prayer.
- 3. The coordinator should extend a cordial welcome to all guests and mention that this is an annual Promotion or Community Guest Day.
- 4. Mission presentation. The person or persons chosen to talk about missions should be carefully chosen and urged to prepare well. If the story from the Mission Quarterly is used, be sure it is told and not read.
- 5. The lesson study. Class leaders should be instructed to prepare especially well for this day. Visitors should be welcomed, introduced by name to the class and encouraged to participate in the discussion of the lesson if they wish.

#### PERSONAL MINISTRIES - SABBATH SCHOOL'S PARTNER IN MINISTRY

HOMES OF HOPE: Opening the door of hope to lost people.

REASON FOR: Hospitality is the "welcome mat" ministry of God's Kingdom. Few will enter into church life without having first spent time in a church member's home. The importance of this work is noted in the words of the apostle Peter who said, "Do not neglect to entertain the stranger." (Hebrews 13:2)

Homes of Hope is a nation-wide church strategy designed to systemically "roll out the welcome mat" to those in our community who are seeking something better for their life. Research of newcomers to church tells us that 80% of people joining the church have been brought by a friend or family member. These people attend church because they want to explore what they have observed in a church member's life. Homes of Hope attempts to increase the number of opportunities for seekers to share in our lives.

Homes of Hope is not a program but rather a ministry lifestyle. Participants in this ministry are released from all other major church responsibilities for the purpose of building friendships. These friendships provide opportunities for seekers to explore Christian faith and practice in a non-threatening environment.

The key ingredients for this ministry are a home, friendly disposition, partner or friend to share in a weekly party (i.e. social activity) and a supportive Sabbath School class or small group.

#### **RATIONALE**

The strategy is based on the following rationale:

- 1. Newcomers are seeking relationship before truth. The National Church Life Survey found that while newcomers may be of any age, they are much more likely to be in their 20s and 30s.
- They are made up of first-timers (often in their 20s without children) and returnees (often in their 30s with children).
- Newcomers are more likely to be tentative in their church involvement.

## Prerequisite For Involvement

- 1. A living faith.
- 2. A commitment to twelve months of ministry.
- 3. A commitment to a weekly activity (except holidays, illness, etc.)
- 4. A supportive Sabbath School class or home group that conducts a monthly social activity.
- 5. Involvement in a home group or Sabbath School class.
- 6. Church Board approval.

## Description

#### PRISON MINISTRY HAPPENINGS



County Jail Hosts Resource Fair

Minnesota's Dakota County Jail held its first Resource Fair in October, gathering representatives from 19 schools, churches, treatment programs, transitional houses, and state and county work

force centers. Whereas Resource Fairs are nothing new for state prisons, they are an innovation for a county jail, reported TwinCities.com.

Correctional officers explained that transitional services for inmates are almost nonexistent because of the transient nature of the jail population—the average stay at Dakota County is just eight days. The jail, which last hosted a Resource Fair seven years ago, now hopes to hold one every six months, said Larinda Hodges, the jail's first official outreach coordinator.

"The main task is to reduce the number of times we see these guys—recidivism," Hodges said. "I'm just throwing darts. If it works, I keep going." Although no one at the Dakota County Jail tracks recidivism statistics, jail officials say, "frequent fliers" are common. In some cases, they report, the jail has housed multiple generations of the same family throughout several years.
