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LET'S START A Wellness Epidemic

wenty-two people braved the snowy, icy weather to attend the second organizational meeting of the Adventist Health Network held at Columbia Union College, Takoma Park, Maryland. After introductions, Dr. DeWitt Williams passed out a



form which discussed the reasons for calling the group together.

There are approximately 90 Adventist churches within 25 miles of the General Conference headquarters building. But instead of working together on health issues the churches are separated by three conferences: Allegheny East, Potomac, and Chesapeake. They are further separated by three geographic and administrative areas: Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia.

Then there are the separations of racial and cultural differences. "The Adventist Health Network will be an attempt to tear down the walls of place, taste, face, race and grace and impact the cities of Baltimore, Washington and surrounding areas with better health," Williams said. "Church leaders retire, are switched to other positions, and often have little interest and finances in this area of ministry. We need a group of volunteer, lay health professionals that will impact these cities through marketing, training, and resource services on a constant basis," he explained. After much discussion and input, several committees were set up. The steering committee would draw up a constitution, define qualifications for officers and outline short-term and long-range goals and projects. It was to also investigate how to set up

a 501(C)3 organization that can receive grants; a media and communication committee, to explore the establishment of a website and a newsletter, update the roster of the 90 churches in the area, and develop a calendar of events.

A final committee was to explore ways Adventists could become involved in political action and advocacy and faith-based initiatives.

Dr. Al Bacchus closed the session by discussing a program he had developed on starting a wellness epidemic. Just as germs touch each other and infect healthy cells, Christians should be able to touch others, their homes, churches and communities with our healthy lifestyles and inspire them to become healthier. "More powerful than SARS and AIDS would be the epidemic caused by this group," he said.

Now, seven months later, the Adventist Health Network has a constitution, a board, a president and an executive director, and is moving towards the goals that it has formulated. More than 45 members regularly attend the meetings.

Wellness Epidemic Continued

Attorney Ron Wylie has been selected as the executive director for the new organization. Wylie also heads up the Adventist Community Services of Washington, DC, and sees the partnership as a wonderful joint venture to do big things in the community.

Dr. Jim Sharps, a member of the Atholton church, was selected as the president of AHN and proposed several intro-

ductory goals and priorities which the board had delineated:

- **1** Coordinate with Hospice to establish a niche and value added linkage with the community;
- 2 Link with Food and Friends, a six-milliondollar, 1,100-client, free food and meal community-based program;
- 3 Secure the services of two interns from Columbia Union College to focus on AHN programs and initiatives;
- 4 Develop a liaison with Adventist Health Services and Washington Adventist Hospital;
- 5 Pilot the Christ-centered wellness program developed by Dr. Al Bacchus among the constituent AHN churches;
- 6 Organize a city-wide Health Fair;
- 7 Work with the constituent churches to increase participation in Adventist Health Study 2, being promoted by Loma Linda University; and
- 8 Continue to set up the calendar of health activities of the 90 churches.

"Churches are doing outstanding things and nobody else knows what they are doing. If somebody is conducting a vegetarian cooking school, all 90 churches should know about and promote it in their community," says Dr. Sharps.

"The Network meets every six weeks," says Pastor Ray Nelson, Vice President of the group, "and the board even more frequently. It requires a lot of extra work and commitment of our time, but we are excited as we see God leading us in a united fashion here in the nation's capital."

Also, when people have to promote an idea, through an essay or a poster they come to believe in it, or more so if they didn't before.

Last year this contest was opened to all schools who wanted to participate—even those not in the Seventh-day Adventist school system. And we had some winners for the second year from the
